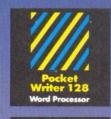

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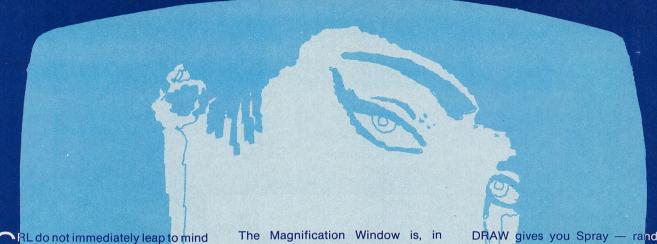
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THE HARGE

CRL's new graphics package claims to be "a computer graphic package with a difference". Zack Skinner takes a close look to find out if he and you will be disappointed or be shouting "Vive la difference!".



as a company who would produce a brand new graphics package. Yet here they are coming up with a piece of software for the 64 (also for the 128 in 64 mode) that sets out to challenge for a market which already has a number of well-regarded, well-established graphic products. Recent CCI s have seen such interesting packages as Rainbird's ART STUDIO and Culton's DRAWING BOARD — both interesting from the graphics point of view and by no means expensive. What can CRL's IMAGE SYSTEMoffer that the others cannot and is it worth buying if you do not yet possess a graphics package?

Well, it is certainly not difficult to use. Most of the time, the rankest novice can make it work with no great effort of technique or creativity. Creativity, that's a word we'll come back to later. One of the reasons it is simple to start with is that it uses the familiar joystick for many of its commands - although it is recommended to use a tracker ball if you have got one THE IMAGE SYSTEM has the helpful idea of using windows and pull-down menus to bring all its functions together and to make it easy to select the substantial number of relatively sophisticated operations that it makes available. Most of them you control with nothing more complicated than a squeeze on the fire button - not very difficult for anyone. You simply guide the cursor, arrow shaped like that of the AMIGA, onto the appropriate icon, press the fire button and you are away. There are only a few functions for which you have to return to the keyboard. One of these - the Commodore key - just lets you pull up the Master Control Screen to view the whole graphics screen.

The Magnification Window is, in effect, a zoom that lets you take an enlarged view of the pixels surrounding the cursor. The actual pixel you are looking at appears inside the small flashing box at the centre of the window. A useful idea, as you might be trying to work on just one pixel. You also have a memory meter to keep track of free memory available for image or text font storage. There are roughly 10k bytes of image storage available. If you go over the top of that you will have to save or erase images.

MENUS

There are eight main menus that give access to THE IMAGE SYSTEM's draw functions. Across the top of the Master Control Screen, there is a menu bar. When you move the cursor onto one of the menu headings, press the fire button, down comes an option menu. Moving the cursor while the fire button is held down lets you make your selection; releasing the fire button activates your selection. There are some sub-menus, such as the Printer option that will give you a further menu option. Some others, like the Clear Screen option, will bring down what THE IMAGE SYSTEM calls "Communication Windows. These contain restricted but important choices such as continuing or clearing the screen which you have to complete before the system will let you go on.

THE MENU LIST

These are the main menus
DRAW
IMAGE
BRUSH
TEXTURE
TEXT
PRINT
and the SPECIAL Menu.

DRAW gives you Spray — random patterns of pixels; a standard Flood Fill; Area colour which lets you change colour for a definable area; Colour scheme that differentiates in specific colours within an area; Colour copy which lets you copy and move colour in rectangular shapes. There is also a number of other options such as drawing an ellipse or circle; or boxes and lines.

THE IMAGE MENU

One of the most important features of THE IMAGE SYSTEM is its ability to store and manipulate sub-images. Up to 64 separate images can be stored in memory for later retrieval. Each image is essentially two-dimensional but can be scaled and distorted with very little restriction to provide effects normally only associated with expensive systems. An image can be anything from a single pixel up to an entire screen — though practical limitations such as available memory space will not permit many very large images to be held in memory simultaneously.

You can print the resulting image to the graphics screen. The prepared box can be moved freely around the screen and printed repeatedly. You can eliminate specific pixels from the image during printing to give the illusion that certain part of your image are transparent. Rather a bright idea.

THE BRUSH MENU

THE IMAGE SYSTEM supports 32 user re-definable brush templates for drawing purposes. The templates are used as 'masks' for the associated texture patterns.

The entire set of brush templates can be saved to tape or disk and a new set loaded.

You can print the actual brush template onto the screen enabling you to edit its shape. All brushes are 16 pixels wide (8 in Multi-colour mode) by 16 pixels high.

THE TEXTURE MENU
As well as the brush templates, THE IMAGE SYSTEM also supports 64 userre-definable texture patterns. Like the brushes the patterns are 16 pixels wide (8 in Multi-colour mode) by 16 pixels high. Any texture can be dumped to the screen for subsequent editing.



This menu gives you some helpful utilities like Cursor Speed adjusting from very slow — which may be suitable for detailed joystick control - to very fast which is intended for working with tracker-balls.

For those who wish to use pictures in their own programs there is a simple Basic program which loads and displays pictures created using THE IMAGE SYSTEM.

The manual provided for this range of features is, believe it or not, very short —

painting facilities THE IMAGE SYSTEM lets you create your own text fonts. It also cleverly lets you zoom, scale, rotate even fold your pictures in a simulated 3D environment. Well, it is true to say that not all graphics packages of this level do provide all these facilities. especially at this price. However, in most cases you could probably make out reasonably well if you tried hard enough with what they have - or were sufficiently expert. What I think makes this package an excellent buy is not that at all. It is, apart from the low price, the exceptional ease of use.

It is clear that anyone could use this package to produce some very adequate graphics results. The menus are simple to use and the whole IMAGE SYSTEM is really 'user friendly'. You put it up and away you go.

Some of the results that have been produced by experienced artists you can see on these pages and no-one would be ashamed to call them first class. One of the others has been used on the cover of this CCI. I have seen worse results produced on much more expensive systems or even on the AMIGA, which is the standard by which all graphics is today beginningto be judged.

And that brings me back to "creativity". CRL claims that THE IMAGE SYSTEM will "let your creativity flow". There's no doubt that is an absolutely true claim. It is a package that you can master in a reasonably short time. It has lots of easy and attractive features. It can be an ideal package for a first-timer in the graphics field. It will let you be as creative as you have the imagination to be. At its price, it has got to be an



THE TEXT MENU

THE IMAGE SYSTEM also provides a fairly flexible text printing facility. Up to 90 different characters can be produced directly from the keyboard. Entire fonts can be saved to disk or tape and new fonts loaded in as required. Individual characters or completely new fonts can be defined using the text grab function. Text characters can be any size from a single pixel to an image up to 32 pixels wide (16 in Multi-colour mode) byt 48 pixels high.

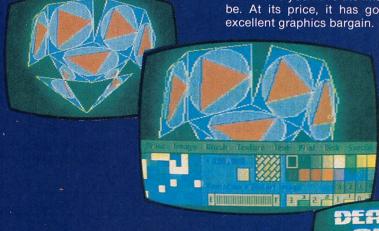
THE PRINT MENU

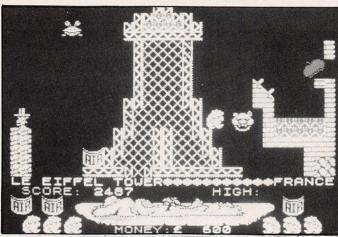

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Timeworks SWIFTCALC-128 with SIDEWAYS

n all honesty the arrival of yet another spreadsheet for the Commodore 128 was greeted with groans at the Donald mansion until I realised that this was different. Not only does it include a graphics option but also the facility to print out very wide spreadsheets, viz. those wider than 80 or 132 columns, by rotating the text through 90 degrees — very clever stuff indeed. So let's take a look at Swiftcalc-128.

The product is designed for use on the Commodore 128 in 80-column mode supporting either monochrome or colour - there is no provision for 40column display. Loading is commendably fast and a spreadsheet of maximum dimensions 250 rows by 250 columns is available. Timeworks Ltd, the supplier make a variety of software products for the Commodore 128 including their Data-Manager and Word-Writer, a database and word processor respectively. These can interlink data together although on testing Swiftcalc-128 with competitive products such as Superscript-128 and Superbase-128 presented problems — the files are incompatible. I decided against examining the files on the disk with an editor purely on the basis that it was too much messing around and the manual provided no clues as to the filing structure. A disappointment this since this form of locking-in users with your own range of products is ultimately short-sighted in the long term. So gentlemen, I'm still looking for a standard spreadsheet for my 128D.

The manual supplied with Swiftcalc-128 was excellent, 191 pages with the bonus of an index and examples shows that, at last the software houses are getting the message about poor quality manuals. It is easily the best I have seen for any Commodore 128 spreadsheet a pity the author(s) does not get a credit for a work to be proud of. Printer support includes both RS-232 and Centronics (both from the User Port) in addition to the usual Commodore series printers. The technique which the Sideways option uses is to switch the printer into graphics mode - users should note that this can be heavy on your printer ribbon which needs to be either a new one or nearly-new in order to gain the full benefits of this option. Note that Sideways is a separate program from Swiftcalc-128 and thus needs to be run independently. The spreadsheet operates on a pull-down menu which is accessed by means of the escape key. The headings and contents of each of these is as follows:

A flaw in **Swiftcalc-128** manifested itself in the selection of *set printer* option in the *Print* menu — with the printer offline or not connected, the system locked completely. Obviously the programmer had either disconnected the IRQ from the RESTORE key and not provided the vectored restart or failed to provide a *timeout* recovery mechanism in the printer driver — either was not good programming practice, the user should always be provided with an escape route from any situation.

The functions provided can handle up to 17 digits, although do not be fooled into thinking that this is the numeric precision, this is a function of the operating system and processor. The usual spreadsheet and mathematical functions were provided along with financial functions such as present and future values of variable or fixed sum. A limited level of programming was built in by the appearance of an if-then-else logical control. Another useful feature of the functions was the Range facility. This allows the testing of a range of values on a what-if basis although this could only operate by reference to the cells numbers directly, it would have been nice to define and use named ranges which are much convenient.

Probably the most impressive feature of **Swiftcalc-128** was the graphics functions. These were wide in scope but also very quick to appear on the screen. The charts appear very quickly indeed after definement of the parameters — not as quick as an AMIGA, but not all that far behind either and certainly the

fastest high resolution graphics I have seen on a Commodore 8-bit machine. I would guess that the programmer is holding a complete screen in the 80-column memory continually thus all that is required is resetting the screen address.

Provision is made for an on-line Help facility which appears as a window. This scrolls to reveal the full range of available functions although it could be clearer to the user that a scroll action is necessary to access the rest of the window. The help is useful but one particular aspect of Swiftcalc-128 that did not please me was the use of the escape key to end a request. This key is an obvious choice for beginning a request but I felt that the RETURN key was the logical candidate for completing a request. Incidentally the supplier also operates a technical support facility for users with tricky problems. Very useful.

Overall, Swiftcalc-128 is very good but could possibly be made better. The design philosophy has clearly been based on that of an earlier product for the Commodore 64. This was acceptable in the days when users had to contend with 40 columns and the programmer had to fit it all into 64k. However, at this level of the market the demands and expectations of users have changed considerably since the arrival of hardware such as the Commodore 128. Nevertheless a good product living up to the Timeworks standard.

128 Hit by Blitz

The 128 version of the basic compiler BLITZ.

If you want to supercharge your basic programs, make them run much faster without writing machine code, then this is for you.

Supersoft, one of the few companies still specialising in Commodore software, have released this version for the 128, 18 months after the release of the very successful 64 version. One thing I like about this latest version is the new price. Talk about value — the original BLITZ 64 sold for £50 last year — the latest prices must be a snip! For £29.95 you get the 128 version or £19.95 for the 64 disk and £14.95 for the 64 tape version.

There is a real need for the programmer, who has not progressed on to machine code, to have his tortoise pace basic programs speeded up. The publishers, in their literature, claim to produce increased speeds of 5, 10 or even 20 times faster! However the programs I converted to BLITZ averaged an increased speed of only around 1½ times. I don't know what I get wrong!

The new 128 version is, of course, now highly compatible with all of the basic V7.0 and, indeed, with some of the basic extensions available. BLITZ is so easy and simple to use. The 12 page instruction manual that accompanies the compiler is concise enough. With an explanation of the six options and five different modes of operating. Error correction and debugging is covered along with further comments on BLITZ v's basic, in order to help your original program gain more speed if the basic copy is written the way BLITZ likes it to

The different options available are for either supporting full basic V7.0 syntax or a limited syntax that has no collision command or resume with a line number rather than a variable. Single, dual or two single drives are catered for. If you're lucky enough to have two drives, then the modes you can operate in are greatly increased. These extra modes include batch compilation, linking programs or chaining.

After selecting your option and mode BLITZ takes over and converts the basic program into 'P' code — a kind of half way house to machine code. When finished, the compiled program is automatically saved to disk. The new directory name contains a prefix "C/" along with another "Z" cross reference file. The later file is only necessary if you have to trace an error that may have occurred during compilation. It is

particularly important that your original basic copy does not contain any bugs as it will show an error during compilation. A program that you know works without any hitch will be fodder to BLITZ and always converts without any problems. The compiled program also disables list.

BLITZ condenses basic to around 60 per cent of its original size. You would expect to see the finished program size to be smaller but there is, however a snag — isn't there always? BLITZ carries a large overhead to cater with the new 128's basic — a staggering 11K — opposed to the 6K for the 64 BLITZ

version. This is to allow space for "run time routines" for each program. This means that you only save space on programs that contained 28K or more. I am sure that it is a small price to pay for the convenience of faster programs.

I must say that Supersoft have a very worthwhile product in BLITZ 128. This has to be a very easy way for the basic programmer to have the extra speed needed to make his basic programs run at a more professional pace.

FIGHTING WORDS

The Jeff Minter Page

There are not many real stars in the computer world, but among them undoubtably glitters Jeff Minter, creator of innumerable smash-hit games. We've given Jeff the freedom to say what he wants (libel laws permitting!), so look out for his hard-hitting pages in future issues of CCI. You may not always agree with what he says, but he's certainly worth listening to. CCI won't always agree with what he says either, but we promise to print it anyway!

A high altitude article this month: I'm writing this in my flat in the French Alps, it's snowing outside making the pistes even better. I just got back from a morning's skiing (there is nothing quite like a good ski to get rid of a hangover!) I've got a C128 here and I'm putting in a few hours a day on Revenge II in between the piste and the bar.

I'm sorely missing my Atari ST, for Colourspace (Psychedelia on the Commodore just ain't the same) and also for writing this article — I haven't written a substantial amount longhand since I was at University, and my handwriting is completely shot.

At last we've seen the new AMIGA, the A500, and I must say it looks exactly as I expected it to; sort of a cross between a C128, same spaceship shape, and an ST. Gone is the daunting IBM-PC look of the old Amiga, and a good thing too. The A500 looks like a home computer, not a business box. When it's released it should have Kickstart in ROM, which is a relief, because one thing that has always annoyed me about the Amiga was that the operating system codes was always in a constant state of flux, and you could never be sure that your old software would run under a new release of Kickstart.

Given that Commodore can achieve the expected £500-odd price level for the A500, the Amiga should finally start to do great things. The A500 is what Commodore should have released in the first place; if they had, I suspect Atari would have had a hard time trying to sell the ST alongside it. As it is, the new Amiga should do very well as a logical (and affordable!) upgrade path for C64 owners, and the ST, being already wellestablished, won't die out; but I think that the introduction of the A500 will prompt Atari to dish out some hefty cuts. Look for a £200 ST sometime this year. £200 for a 512K 16-bit machine represents extraodinary value for money, and I see no reason why the ST should not sell strongly, alongside the

Between them, the A500 and the ST will become the main-line machines of the 16-bit home market, much like the Commodore 64 and Spectrum are in the 8-bit market. 8-bit stuff will gradually die out, and within two years the C64 will be as dead as the Vic 20 is now.

This will, of course, cause a major upheaval in the software market. I don't think that there will be as many very young (sat 12-14 year old) owners of the new machines, at least at first, for unless they have very rich daddies indeed they won't be getting an A500 for Christmas! The owners of the new machines will be people who have had 8-bit machines, and who actually have an interest in machines, maybe programming or generally using the machines for a genuine purpose, not just games. So Johnny who has a 64 and tape deck and one joystick and just uses it as a games engine probably won't get an A500, but Jimmy who has a disk drive and a modem and is learning machine code etc., probably will.

But if you look at the software market, and specifically the likes of US Gold and Ocean et al., you see that their whole existence is geared to selling to the schoolboy - games-machine type of user. These companies will have to begin producing quite different types of software for the 16-bit scene - conversions of old games just won't do. For a start, 16-bit stuff won't be at pocket money prices. To utilise fully the potential of one of these new machines takes a lot of time and creative input on behalf of the programmer, and such things don't come cheap. Plus, our 16bit user is likely to want to more than just play a gamek. He'll want to be doing something more — designing his own games, making music whatever. The great thing about the new machines is that they have the power to make the creative process more accessible — even a non-artist can produce satisfying results on Neochrome or Colourspace, and someone who can't even read music can enjoy using instant music on the Amiga

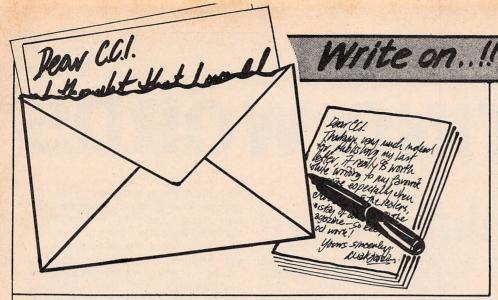
There will stil be a market for good games, but it won't be as large as the 8-bit market, where games constitute just about the whole scene (how many utilities have you seen in the Top 10?).

So in the new 16-bit era, look for a decline in the volume of games being produced, but an increase in quality; and look ofr a new generation of programs which use the power of the new machines to make the creative process in a variety of areas more accessible to the user. This type of software shows the way in which the software market is maturing; rather than the machine just being a 'toy' to play games on, it becomes a genuinely useful tool to provide easier access to the creative urge which lies within all of us. Basically, technology takes the place of a lengthy learning process, allowing us to develop more creative skills faster than has previously been possible.

Enough of this brave-new-world stuff anyway, and on to something more mundane but which might have a very satisfying twist to it: Both Atari and Amstrad are releasing games-only machines in the near future; the Amstrad based on the Spectrum (euch!) and the Atari based on the 8-bit Atari. If these are successful, Atari are thinking of releasing another game machine, this time based on the ST. Now, if this all comes together and Atari and Amstrad start making heavy bread in the dedicated game market, would it not be natural for Commodore to want a slice of the action? And guess what machine they'd use? The Amiga, right? If you know your Amiga history, you'll know that the Amiga was to be - a dedicated games machine! So during the course of its history the Amiga will have gone from game machine to business machine then home computer (via the A500) and finally back to its original, intended purpose. Very satisfying completion of

Well, that's it for this month — I must get back to more important things — like improving my skiing and getting a good tan!

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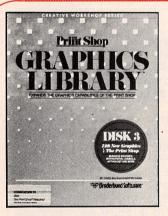
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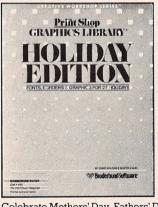

TRANSCRIPTION PROBLEMS . . .

Dear Rae.

'I entered 'Data Detective' (another program to print the day of week given the date) but all I get is a syntax error on line

Line 10 in question (DIM M(12): For I=1 TO 12: READ A: M(I)=A: NEXT) certainly works on the Plus/4; you must have a typing error, which could be cleared up in seconds with a look at what you actually have on tape or disk. The Plus/4's Help Key may give you a clue where the mistake is. I'd guess you may have confused 'I' with '1', or possibly entered the program in shifted mode.

Dear Rae,

'I'm working on a C64 machine language program involving the movement of a ball, which I want to get as smooth as possible. The interrupt routine (which reads the keyboard, controls the cursor flash, etc) is obviously an important factor in the timing of animation, and I experimented to find its exact time by putting a wedge into \$0314/5 to start timer B of C1A2 at £FFFF. A loop checked and deducted the value of time B from £FFFF using the FAC routines and printed the value out. I found it difficult to believe the result of approx. 9000, implying half the processor's time was spent servicing the interrupt.

like it: 0NPUT "INTERRUPTS/SEC";T: D.N.Hookings, Criccieth.

Yes, I have. I have to say I think your industry is a bit misplaced! In the first place, the sort of program you're writing is hard to debug; CIA2 may, for example, be generating NMI interrupts (see p.127 of my book); or your maths routines may have errors. In the second place, the interrupt routine doesn't last a fixed time; a keypress, or multiple keypresses, send the routine off throughout the ROM.

Try this simple program or something like it: 0INPUT "INTERRUPTS/SEC";T: TT=1000000/T: HI%=TT/256: POKE 56324, TT-256★HI%: HI%: LIST which sets the IRQ timer to generate the requested number of interrupts per second. You'll find the 64 can handle over 30000 interrupts per second. Generally, the 64 spends less than 1% of its time of interrupts.

128 and 64 COMPATIBILITY...

Dear Rae,

'I've purchased a 128, one of the major reasons being that all 64 games were

absolutely compatible with my 128.

However, I have a game called 'The Double' which loads perfectly on the 64 but on the 128s at my disposal I get a black and white screen.. the reset switch flips on the game for a spilt second..'

Yes. The 128 in 64 mode (you don't say so, but you must know that 64 mode on the 128 needs, for example, GO 64?) isn't absolutely compatible. One difference is in its VIC chip, which has an extra register tacked on the end which sets the processor in fast mode, switching off the screen in the process. It may be that your game alters this register, in which case there's little you can do except disassemble the whole thing and look for the relevant code.

Since there are loads of other games for the 64, I'd suggest using them instead.

BUSINESS QUERY...

Dea Rae,

'I'm interested in buying either a Commodore 128 or an Amstrad 6128. My intention is to use it for computer records. I require a program that keeps ledger sheets for about two hundred debtors, seventy creditors, a cash book and bank balance...'

I'd suggest you enquire about Microclerk, a program for the 128 available from JCL Software, of Tunbridge Wells, Kent. This could be just what you're looking for.

Dear Rae,

'Your magazine's excellent Printer Enhancer program (Nov. 86) unfortunately has several print symbols I cannot decipher, on lines 100, 60235, and 60285. How should they be entered?' Ivor Gertler, Acton.

As I've mentioned before, programs listed on daisywheel printers, or non-Commodore compatible dot matrix printers, can't manage Commodore's graphics character set. Often these are drawn in by hand, and can be hard to decipher. However, only a few occur often (except in some graphics programs), chiefly the 'clear screen' and 'home cursor' characters. All these show up in print statements within double quotes. Try pressing " followed by, say, the HOME key if you're not sure about this. 'Reverse on' and the colours need the CONTROL key to be pressed

Dear Rae,

'I get an 'out of memory' error on line 130 of your 'Printer Enhancer' program. It is frustrating! Please help!'

The line is 130 DIM BO(490), TP (490), CT(490), CB(490). Four very large arrays are being defined here. My book 'Programming the Commodore 64' (Enquiries: Biblios, on 0403-710971) in its section on storage of variables shows that each of these arrays takes up 2462 bytes, so four will need nearly 10K of memory. You may simply have lengthened the original too much, e.g. with REM statements.

To cure this problem, add line 129 PRINT FRE(0): END which will stop the program after telling you how much space it has just before the arrays are set up. You can then trim your program to fit.

Another approach is to use integer arrays (i.e. BO%(490) and so on; these take less than half the space — provided, as seems to apply here, that each element of the array is an integer, between about -32000 and =32000.

INTERRUPTS!

Dear Rae.

Tive been trying to get a sprite to travel across the 64's screen whilst still being able to type commands in Basic. Please explain interrupts before I go mad trying.' M.A. Smith, Bures Suffolk.

There's simply not enough space to explain fully. The idea is that, with nearabsolute regularity, the 64 stops what it's doing every fiftieth of a second and looks at the keyboard, the tape ports, and a few other things. This is called a 'background' program. To add your own extras to it, you'll need to know machine language, and how to write you own extra interrupt routines.

I'd suggest you read my book; page 272 has a detailed breakdown of what to do, and the techniques can be used, like polling, the uses of clocks, and the use of special locations to activate background programs. For a newcomer, stick to IRQ interrupts; the 64 uses nonmaskable interrupts (NMIs) too, but it's best to stick to one type.

My book has plenty of examples, e.g. to read joysticks, and a music reading and playing program which is timed by interrupts.

As a simple taster, try POKE 56235,3 or 2. This speeds up the interrupt rate so much that screen editing becomes difficult. A smaller value, such as 1, slows basic bery noticeably (try LIST), since there are so many interrupts.

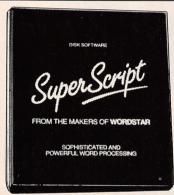
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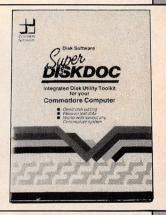
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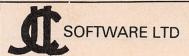
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VOICEMASTER By ANCO

It is quite a time since a full sound package emerged for the 64. And, in fact, that still goes as true. For THE VOICEMASTER is not as new as it might seem. It is a US development that appeared early last year in the United States and has been talked about ever since in other countries with a kind of desperate longing. A few copies arrived, slightly smuggled and its fame spread. ANCO themselves have been promising for some time — waving bits of tempting information in front of our anxious noses, as if to inflame our ravenous appetites for what promised to be a very interesting development in a field sound — where all too rarely these days is anything new to be seen or heard. Personally I suspect that VOICEMASTER itself goes back longer than just 1986 and was an earlier product that has been improved. Anyway, at least it is here and ANCO were kind enough to get CCI the first real look at it. There are some consolations for working on a magazine that everybody believes is not biased!

The VOICEMASTER arrives with both disk and cassettes. 2 cassettes marked Version 4.0 which is what leads me to think that this is an improved rather than brand new product. It takes quite a while to get to 4.0 of anything! It also contains hardware - the necessary leads and plugs etc, earphones and a flat boxshaped Speech and Music Processor. There is also a comprehensive 44 page instruction manual that you will have to read once and then to which you will frequently refer.

If you are new to VOICEMASTER style product you will probably wish to experiment with some of the many demonstration programs contained on the VOICEMASTER disk or cassette, such as a talking calculator, blackjack game, and others.

The VOICEMASTER disk contains essential utility software as well as a number of demonstration programs. It has three main functions, speech recording and playback, word recognition, and music writing from voice input. But to do this best you will need a separate manual. Speech recording and playback can be had in combination with word recognition so as to implement a two way dialogue with the computer. A speech recording can also be modified with forms of editing to improve quality and intelligibility on playback (or to create sounds not like those recorded).

Cut and Paste

VOICEMASTER may find its greatest use in recording speech for later playback. VOICEMASTER hardware is not required for playback from prerecorded vocabularies. High quality speech can be realized with various forms of editing. There are different variations of the ANCO speech editor. The one contained on the VOICE-MASTER disk is an amplitude editor. A more sophisticated version which allows "cut and paste" operations with time slices in the millisecond range as an option. (It is called "Speech Construc-

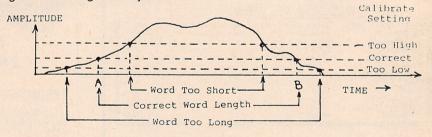
The VOICEMASTER manual asks you, more or less, what you want to do. It makes certain suggestions (and then tells you how to do something) but the options it provides are really limitless. You can do simple things like make a talking keyboard or a talking cash register or go onto more interesting things like a talking alarm system.

obey your spoken commands (Not all of them! you have to be careful what you ask it!). It will store up to 64 sounds in memory and let you add speech to your own programs. It has a user definable sound sampling rate and it includes a graphics based speech editor for making up your own sounds.

It will recognise 32 words or phrases initially and you can add more words yourself and it will, through its "Musical Harp" software, convert the pitch of the human voice or other sounds into musical notes up on the screen. And it will then let you print out your "composition" (and it may sound and look very odd indeed!) onto a dot matrix printer.

It has some special options for the more advanced computer musician: it has software drivers for MIDI; machine language source listings, voice activated macros and its high quality "cut and paste" system - "Speech Construction Set" - lets you create your own electronic speech.

This is a package that will certainly



Effects of Calibration Setting

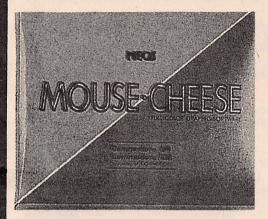
All of these ideas, as it is careful to point out, need some familiarity though by no means much expertise with Basic. You will have to type in little programs to be able to achieve exciting results.

And you certainly can do some amazing things. Amazing when you consider what it would have cost only a year or two ago to get this sort of thing done professionally - and now for £59.95, you can do it yourself!

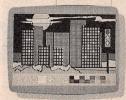
For example, you can get the computer to talk back to you in what approximates to your own voice. It will

appeal to anyone who has an interest as yet unsatisfied in developing the sound capabilities of a 64 — and as everyone knows, they are enormous and just waiting to be exploited. It is not a little toy you can pick up and jump straight into being an expert without even reading the instructions. It is not a shoot 'em up game level piece of goods. VOICEMASTER is a fully usable speech and music processor and for the money it is first class value and it will provide an excellent introduction to the magic world of computer sound and music.

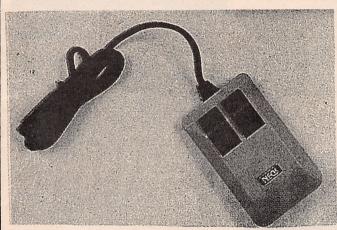












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The Linker and System 7

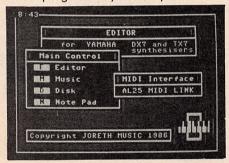
New MIDI Joreth Programs. Ian Waugh plugs 'em in and tries 'em out.

ast your mind back to May 1985, to that fateful day when you read page 19 of your favourite Commodore magazine (CCI, you wally!) extolling the virtues of Joreth's MCS (Music Composer System).

The MCS was — and still is — a remarkable piece of MIDI software not least of all because it contains real- and step-time sequencing in one package. Both methods have their advantages but many musicians have a penchant for one or the other. Joreth's Linker was designed after receiving feedback from real-time aficionados.

The Linker is a stand-alone package which effectively replaces the real-time part of the MCS. Its task is to link sections of music together; a task it takes very seriously, too, as it can store up to 8 tracks of sequences each containing 16

The linking of sequences is not restricted to sections of music; indeed you can dive down into MIDI and link a sequence of bytes. There is provision for gotos (one in the eye for the structured programmer) and repeats. You



can cut and paste your music with greater precision than was ever before possible.

If you have used the MCS, you need to make a small mental adjustment when using the Linker because you now have not only Tracks, Parts, Tunes and Songs but also Links and, in the Linker, Parts take on a slightly different meaning. It takes a little getting used to but, like all Joreth's software, it is very comprehensive and a little time must be spent to become familiar with it.

To help you on your way, the Linker manual contains a 10-page tutorial which takes you step by step through a typical link process.

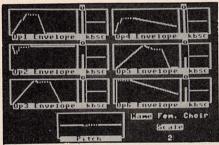
The Linker is ideally suited to producing tight arrangements but I also used it to construct a 'composition' from ran-

dom sections of a few bar's improvistion. Perhaps rather a frivilous use of the program but I'll bet no other sequencing package has been used in this way!

If you prefer real-time sequencing and this degree of control appeals to you then the Linker could be just what

There can be few more disheartening tasks facing a digital synth owner than programming his instrument. All parameters must be adjusted with only a couple of buttons and maybe a slider. That's the problem with all digital synths but Yamaha's DX7 just happens to be one of the more versatile - and that means complicated.

Joreth's System 7 helps you program the synth and it helps organise the voices into banks of sounds. It works with



Yamaha's TX7, too, if you happen to be a fortunate owner.

The program has three main sections: the Sequencer, the Editor and the Librarian. In the Sequencer you can record a short piece of music which will play while you are editing voices so you can tell what the sounds will be like 'live'.

The Librarian lets you create, organise and store banks of 32 sounds. This works directly on files created on disc but there is also an internal file within the computer's memory which is used to transfer voices to and from the synth. You can give voices new names and a Note Pad facility lets you jot down details of the files. At first sight, the Librarian appears a little complex but this is a result of its versatility and flexibility bywords in Joreth software.

The Editor is where all the hard work is done - or rather it tries to take all the hard work out of the job of editing. The screen is divided into two sections: functions and voice parameters and all parameters are displayed numerically on screen.

The Editor has thoughtfully been supplied with lots of ways to make the job easier. You can turn operators on and off and copy one set of operators parameters to another or exchange them. You can get a graphic display of the algorithm (this is all DX talk, by the way, in case you don't have one) and

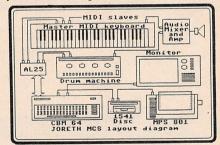


you can call up a graphic display of the operators' envelopes, output, keyboard scaling and pitch.

The disk handling routines are very impressive with lots of helpful messages. A separate card contains a summary of all System 7 operations and the disk itself holds lots of help files. System 7 is quite a complex program but a little time spent with it will be well rewarded. Like the Linker, it too has a Beginner's Guide and, like the Linker, yet more information would still be welcome.

Part of the program leads to a small puzzle and the first three people to solve it wil receive a free Linker. Once solved, you end up in a random voice generator. It's not terribly sophisticated, crammed into 1K of code as it is but it's a nice little extra, and I spent hours playing with it. 320 (non-random) voices are also included on the System 7 disc.

With all this going for it, System 7 is a pretty impressive piece of software and I would suggest it is indespensible to the DX7 and TX7 owner. Nicely priced, too. You don't have to be a DX whizz kit to use it and once you do you'll wonder how you ever managed without it.



Both System 7 and Linker are compatible with Joreth's excellent AL25 MIDI Interface - if you are particularly interested in synthing equipment, check this out. Joreth programs will also work with cartridge port interfaces such as Siel. Jellinghaus, Microvox, Steinberg and Sequential so you've no excuse for not buying one!

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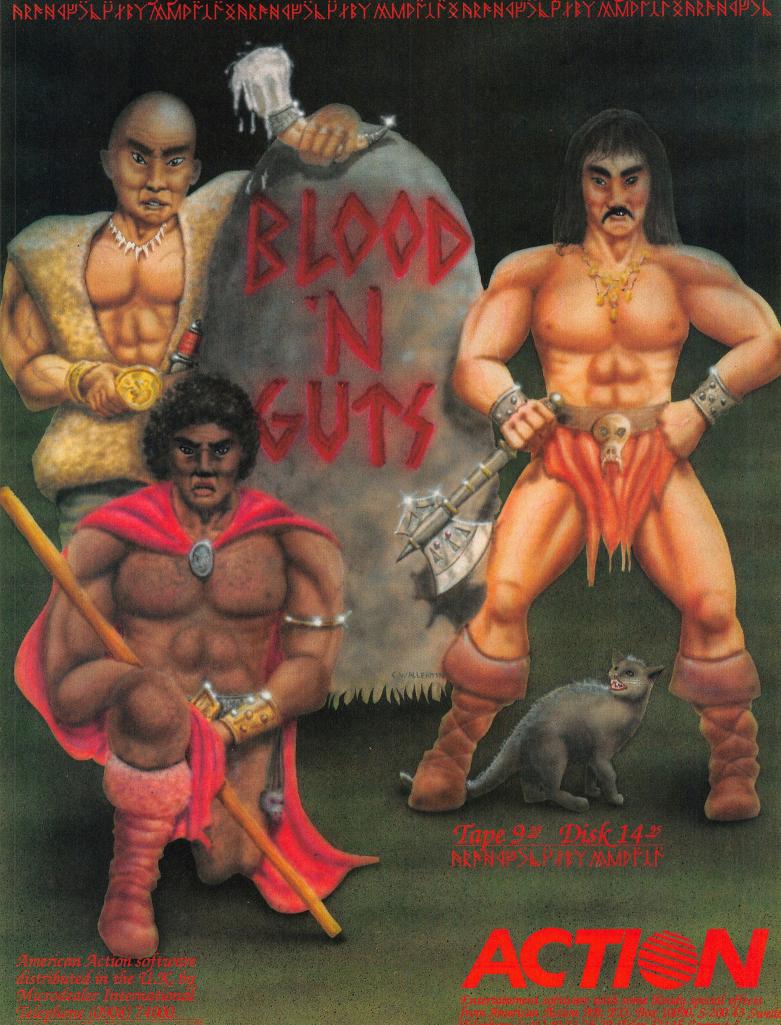
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Konami's European Software Manager, Luther de Gale, represents his company the way a Samurai warrior might protect and advance the cause of his feudal Japanese lord — with strength, sharply-honed skill and with total confidence in himself and in Konami's destiny.

"I expect us to be one of the big four. An Ocean, a US Gold..." He says with the certainty of one who has seen at close quarters the capacity for planning, execution and global success of Japanese industry. When he describes the record Konami has achieved in its seventeen years of existence, his confidence seems very likely to be justified.

Konami is, of course, already one of the big four — not of home software but in arcade games, not cassette shoot 'em ups but the real thing; the stand up arcades, the draughty, grubby, swallowyour-pocket-money, crowd-around-tosee who-gets-top-score arcade machine games. Atari, Sega, Nintendo and Konami are names that have become legend. For Konami to move to supplying home computers with versions of its worldwide arcade success would seem an obvious step but, as Luther de Gale points out, it did not happen easily or quickly. Konami was started by four Japanese men — the KO comes from Kozuki the name of the original founder. It began as an organization to service Japanese arcade machines. Not a very comfortable choice, for the whole field of arcades was then influenced if not dominated by the Yakuta, Japanese Mafia style gangsters, who shared control of the post WWII entertainment field with Americans. Konami moved from repairing arcade machines to creating the PCB's (Printed Circuit Boards) that went into them. Not the actual manufacture of PCB's but the 'intellectual property', the creation of the game to which these high-powered often 32 bit computer boards are dedicated. Futurists have predicted that we are moving into 'a knowledge based society' where you will sell technological expertise more valuably than manufactured products. Konami are a good example of this. They develop an arcade game, sub-contract the production for the PCB, then distribute them round the

world to be fitted into the almost universally uniform stand up arcade machines and sit back to watch the yen, dollars, pounds, marks, francs etc roll in.

Well, not exactly sit back. For that is where Konami UK and Luther de Gale come in. After Konami's early success with games like Ping Pong and Track 'n Field sports simulations, they decided to join the major Japanese electronics companies move into the home computer business based on a single standard - MSX. MSX... ah yes, not one of the great Japanese success stories so far. With a mere 2% to 3% of the software market today, it tails far behind Commodore and Spectrum. However, Konami, unlike the Sanyos, Sharps and Toshibas has made money out of MSX. It was not fighting for a share of the small, highly competitive hardware market. It sold the relatively expensive MSX cartridges - many to those very same Sanyos, Sharps and Toshibas to bundle with the machines. Konami also supply cartridges for the Nintendo 'Family Computer' — really a games console. 'A major portion of our revenue in Japan' de Gale comments.

Influential Role

Luther de Gale took an influential role in the next step for Konami which was the result of the question 'If we are in the computer software business, why are we ignoring 97% of that business?' the cassette and disk based home computer market. As they had no shortage of games already developed - after all that was Konami's business, they decided they would licence these games to already established games software houses. They picked Ocean. De Gale states 'Ocean have done a good job for us. They have been 'the Konami of Europe'. Ocean have had a number of Konami successes including CCI's 1986 Osker winner the 'Konami Coin-Op Hits' Compilation. Now Konami is moving to the next stage of its operation. The publishing and marketing of its own games. It has set up a company to develop products using the Konami label run by Luther de Gale from West London.

As de Gale points out it has great advantages. "I have secured source of product. Konami has in Japan 140 full

time programmers — specialists all of them. Some do nothing but sound..." This is probably one of the largest game development teams in the world, if not the largest. It makes UK companies even like Ocean look very small.

"When we launch a game it gets market awareness — worldwide". They deal in large figures. "We sold a million Nintendo last Christmas — 50,000 in the US alone." That means that a Konami game that is already a hit in the arcades will have had huge publicity. "Originally there was a fear from arcade owners of affecting their trade but arcade games last three months and it would take me at least three months to develop the home computer version..."

Jailbreak

De Gale's team in the UK is now about 15 strong to take care of current projects but will probably have to grow. The first release under his control has been Jailbreak which has topped the Micro Dealer Chart. A typical arcade style shoot 'em up with not much story but fast exciting action, it is clearly a game that will rate high for the home computer arcade fan. Next on the list is Nemesis, just being released. De Gale sees his job to develop a top team of young, creative programmers. Simon Pick, the programmer of Nemesis is typical of the breed. 20 years of age, a student in Computer Science and Artificial Intelligence at Sussex University he already has games successes behind him, including the well regarded 'Mad Nurse' which came out on an economy label "That took me two weeks" he told CCI, "I've spent more than seven months on Nemesis, getting it right". Nemesis, from the first look CCI got of it, seems superior even to Jailbreak, the kind of game that would get stand up arcade fans pouring their money into the machines. General opinions are that it looks like Konami has got a hit with Nemesis. But de Gale's plans for Konami are based on more than a few isolated releases. He intends to build the Konami name into a major force with backing from good customer relations from such things as a Konami Club, a newsletter, a telephone service for queries etc. He wants to show it is 'a company that cares'

If that has the familiar Japanese corporate togetherness ring about it, it may be thought strange coming from a Londoner of West India origin. But Luther de Gale must now include some Japanese characteristics in his British personality — private as well as professional. He speaks Japanese, learn-

ed both at London University (where usefully for someone involved in a big company he also studied politics) and in Osaka in Japan. He is also the UK's leading expert on Nippon Kempo (Japanese Boxing). When he went to Japan, it was to study Karate but found a less common form of martial art. Nippon Kempo is a sport that requires the protection of gloves, solid black leather breastplate and a helmet which looks fearsomely like those used in American football.

De Gale brought back his enthusiasm for Nippon Kempo and there are now more than 300 people of the association who follow the sport in the UK. "It includes all styles, kicking, throwing and punching" says de Gale. He does not look the kind of man to confront without that breastplate and helmet well in place.

He admits now he has little time to play computer games. He leaves that to others in his organization. He sees Konami producing its games across all the formats even the less general like the C16. Stretching still further into the future "The ideal is to develop Konami UK as a software company in its own right but also including third party software... We are going to move away from the days when every software developer could be a software marketing company."

He comments, 'In the West, individualistic and creative talent likes to be independent

but he sees that quality being successfully combined with Konami's corporate strength. His view of the main home computers? "Our established medium, the 64 and the Spectrum, will be around for a long time yet — at least the next two or three years. For Yuppies, there may be a PC market but I'd be very wary of it... Yuppies like to show off at dinner parties, not to be confined in front of a PC . . . I still see the market as the 'annoying little boys' who phone here, who touch everything at exhibitions . . . And the future? "What I set out to do was to create Konami as a software house. I had a lot of patience..." He gives the sense that no less strength and patience will be used in building itup to be 'one of the big four'.

Strength, aggression, patience... Konami reflects the longer term view of Japan of how to achieve and retain success. Luther de Gale has clearly learned and absorbed those formidable qualities. As a combination, they will be difficult to defeat.



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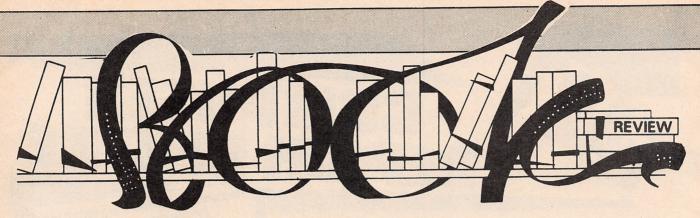
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'The Cult Of Information — The Folklore Of Computers & The True Art Of Thinking' by Theordore Roszak — Lutterworth Press — £12.95

We are being manipulated. By whom? By the information communicators, says Theodore Roszak. In his book 'The Cult of Information', (Lutterworth Press. £12.95), he catalogues chapter and verse of his theory that the computer scientists are slowly and invidiously contriving to make us believe that the computer is an all-powerful god. If they have their way, says Professor Roszak, mankind will eventually defer to the computer in all things and will forget how to plan, dream or even think for itself.

The burden of his argument is that there is a 'vital distinction between what machines do when they process information and what minds do when they think'. That distinction, he says, must be kept in view by teachers and pupils alike, for it must be remembered always that the computer is our servant, it must never be allowed to become our master.

We have had the Ages of Faith, Reason and Delivery, now we are living in the Age of Information and what can communicate information better than a computer? You sit in front of it, press a few buttons, and lo! you can speak to someone in an office halfway across the world. But you can do that just as well on the telephone, argues Prof. Roszak. What he seems to forget is that, at the same time as speaking with someone thousands of miles away, facts and figures can be displayed on the small screen and, very often, showing can be far more memorable than just telling.

Your children can play video games which stretch their imagination, but board games can do that just as well, he adds. And as for the graphics... (and why paint pictures with graphics, complains the author, when a paint brush can do it so much better!), he finds these are 'aesthetically degraded, even ugly ... an eyesore'. I suppose beauty IS in the eye of the beholder but it is precisely these pictorial animations — imperfect though they yet may be —

that make computer games so attractive to the young, and not-so-young, alike. Even 'Trivial Pursuit' — one of the most successful board games ever — has been produced as a computer game and, in that form, is perhaps even more addictive.

As befits a Professor of History and Chairman of General Studies at California State University, Theodore Roszak propounds his arguments logically and with a wealth of facts and figures. For example, he has discovered that 98% of all British schools are microcomputerized, that by the mid-1990's it is estimated that the ratio of pupil to computer in schools in the U.S.A. will be one-for-one and that an astounding \$40 billion dollars was spent on electronics by the Pentagon in 1985. He is naturally worried that the surfeit of computer software and the so-called 'information' it churns out will mean that mankind will stop thinking for itself. That all we need, (or think we need), in the way of knowledge will be programmed and available on a screen.

Erudite and informed as Professor Roszak is, I feel that he is underestimating his fellow man (or woman). The brain which can invent the computer will always be able to control it. There will, inevitably, be some who will fall foul of the 'information cult' and believe anything they see on the computer screen, (just as there are some people who believe that soap-opera characters really exist and are not just actors playing a role) but, conversely, there will also inevitably always be the maverick, the loner, who will look at that information and say 'Why?'

Therein, I am sure, will lie our salvation.

The Micro-Chip, The Story Of A Revolution & The Men Who Made It — T.R. Reid — Pan Books —£3.95

Have you ever wondered why fixing computer problems is called 'debugging'?

In 1944, the University of Pennysylvania had one of the first important digital computers, called ENIAC, whose 'tubes' (valves) had an unfortunate tendency to 'blow' at the most inopportune moments, such as when the U.S. Army was trying to compute artillery trajectories. The cause of the trouble, very often, was moths who were attracted to the soft lights of the tubes. The 'bugs' flew into ENIAC's innards and short circuit the works. Hence, fixing it was called 'debugging'.

This little gem of information, plus many others on the subject of computers and their components, comes from this down-to-earth exposition of the invention of the silicon chip.

Not one but two men were responsible for the micro-chip. Jack St. Clair Kilby, an electronics engineer, worked for

Texas Instruments and, strangely for one who has pioneered the most modern of technologies, he won't hear a digital watch and doesn't use a computer because he 'doesn't know how'. Robert Noyce, a theoretical physicist, was the other. His colleagues call him 'the Mayor of Silicon Valley'. He is also now reputed to be worth upwars of \$100 million.

But the book doesn't only tell the stories of these two men, it spans a century and a half of scientific inventions, showing how other discoveries led to the creation of the 'chip that changed the world'.

Reid gives background histories of the men who made it all possible — from Thomas Edison to Kilby and Noyce — fascinating little stories such as why the 'papparazzi's' favourite phenomenon is something called 'static cling' or why the inventor of the solid-state transistor particularly hates rock and roll.

If you'd just like to expand your knowledge of the silicon chip, its origins and its future, without being buried or bored by a mass of scientific jargon, then this is the book for you.

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Insight Software

Commodore 64 ard, one of st respected Is us that the Interrupts

Peter Gerard, one of the U.K's most respected 64 experts tells us that the 64 dislikes being interrupted as much as you might — and what to do about it.

ne of the most often used features of the Commodore 64, at least in commercial programs, is something known as the Hardware Interrupt Vector. This is a convenient way of allowing two or more things to happen at what appears to be the same time. The 64 isn't a multi-tasking machine, unlike the Amiga, and so this is only an illusion, but by careful application and the speed of nachine code this illusion will be all but transparent to the user. All very well, but what exactly is the Hardware Interrupt Vector (HIV from now on), and how do you, the poor person at the other end of the keyboard, use it in your own programs?

According to the concise Oxford Dictionary, a vector is a quantity determining the position of one point in space relative to another. Put more simply, and in Commodore 64 terms, a vector is some region of the 64 that tells it where something else is going on. Interrupts? Well, you know as well as I do what an interruption is, and indiscriminate interrupting annoys Commodore 64s just as much as it annoys humans, which means that we do have to tread carefully when invoking this feature. Hardware, of course, is the 64 itself. Putting them all together means that in some memory locations within the 64 there is a vector which points to some other memory locations which continually interrupt the computer and, in the case of the HIV, continually update such things as internal clocks, for example.

Now then, if we were to alter this vector we could set up our own program which would interrupt the 64 before it was intended to be interrupted. Provided that we then sent control off to the proper interrupts, all should be well and good. Let's see.

Vectors

On the Commodore 64 the HIV occupies two locations in memory. That's all it needs to occupy, since the 64 can only address 64,000 (all right, 65,536) bytes of memory, and any two consecutive eight-bit hexadecimal numbers can quite easily cope with that. Pardon? Oh, that's another article. Talk to the editor nicely.

The two locations in question are 788 and 789, and if we PEEK them with the standard PRINT PEEK(788) and PRINT

PEEK(789) commands we will find that on power-up they contain the values 49 and 234. A quick conversion to hexadecimal turns that into the numbers 31 and E4 respectively, and in the time honoured tradition of the 64 we must turn those numbers around in order to get the address of a location in memory. Doing that gives us of course the number EA31, and a glance at a memory map for the 64 will tell you that starting at location \$EA31 there is indeed something called the Hardware Interrupt. The vector has done its job, and every sixtieth of a second control of the 64 is diverted from whatever it happens to be doing at the time to that memory location, before returning and getting on with the job in

Now, you may have noticed that the two locations 788 and 789 are in RAM, not ROM, and so to alter them all we need to do is use the POKE command. Don't do it yet! We haven't yet got a program sitting anywhere in the machine that will allow us to interrupt the 64 without causing complete and utter chaos, so, consider the following

Type it in and PLEASE save it (tape or disk, it doesn't matter) before running it. If you find that the program halts with a "DATA ERROR" message in line 15, then check every data line very carefully: there is an error somewhere. However, if all is well then line 16 will be invoked and the HIV has now been altered.

If we look at line 16, we'll see that the values 0 and 192 have been POKEd into locations 788 and 789 respectively. Converting those numbers to hexadecimal gives us 0 and C0, and turning them around as before gives us the memory location \$C0000: this is where the vector is now pointing at, and every sixtieth of a second control of the 64 will now go to that location BEFORE going

to the one mentioned earlier, namely \$EA31. It does get there in the end, it has to, but it performs our own routine before doing so.

How did we decide on location \$C000? Well, that is the start of a block of 4K's worth of spare memory in the 64, and in decimal terms starts at location 49152: hence the loop in line 10. This means that we don't eat into the 38,911 bytes available from BASIC.

And what, precisely, does the program do? Not very much really, but you could use it in a text-only adventure game, perhaps. I've written games before now that have been criticised for the choice of text, border and background screen colours, and even the mighty Infocom are less than superb in that area, using the power-on colours for many of their earlier games. So, providing that nothing else in the program uses interrupts, or ends up at location \$C000 onwards, then this program will keep the critics happy. Pressing 'F1' changes the colour of all the text on the screen, 'F3' changes the border colour, and 'F5' changes the background screen colour. If you're a machine code programmer you'll be able to figure out how it all works, and if you're not it would take too long to go through: suffice it to say that it performs the task it set out to perform.

The rate of change (which you'll note if you keep your finger on the key rather that just tapping them) is determined by the value in location 49261, which currently contains a 60. You can alter that by POKE 49261,1 (or whatever: use any number from 0 to 255) to see what difference it makes.

Conclusion

Finally, to prove that the 64 still functions as normal (well, nearly) I ran a simple program and timed the difference in execution time. The 64 is running approximately 1.47% slower with the HIV altered than it is with the HIV pointing to where it should be pointing. And if I could function at only 1.47% slower than normal every time the telephone rang, I'd be a happy man.

To conclude, the use of the HIV is nothing mysterious or alarming, and is very easy to incorporate in your own programs, provided that you follow three golden rules:

- 1) Make sure you alter the HIV correctly.
- 2) Make sure your own program works!
- 3) Make sure you get to location \$EA31 **P.G.** in the end.

144 tiles (a bit like Dominos) are arranged in a random pyramid



to 5 tiles deep in the centre). You remove tiles by sliding them left or right, so if the stack on either side is the same height or higher, the tile is declared 'NOT FREE'. There are several suits, some numbered like playing cards, others bearing unique symbols that fall into character groups that are almost impossible to memorise and pretty hard to make out on screen. The base object is to clear all the tiles away, two at a time. You do this a bit like playing 'snap'. Simply put the cursor on one tile, and then on the one you think it matches. At this time the tiles will either be removed or you will be informed that they were 'NOT FREE'. If you get stuck there is a 'reveal' icon which will almost certainly show you some pairs you may have missed.

There are several variations to the game, which can either be played as Solitaire or against friends in a Tournament — you can even put a time limit on your moves. The computer never acts as a player, only as a Judge, and games can be drawn-out affair that may or may not be to your liking.

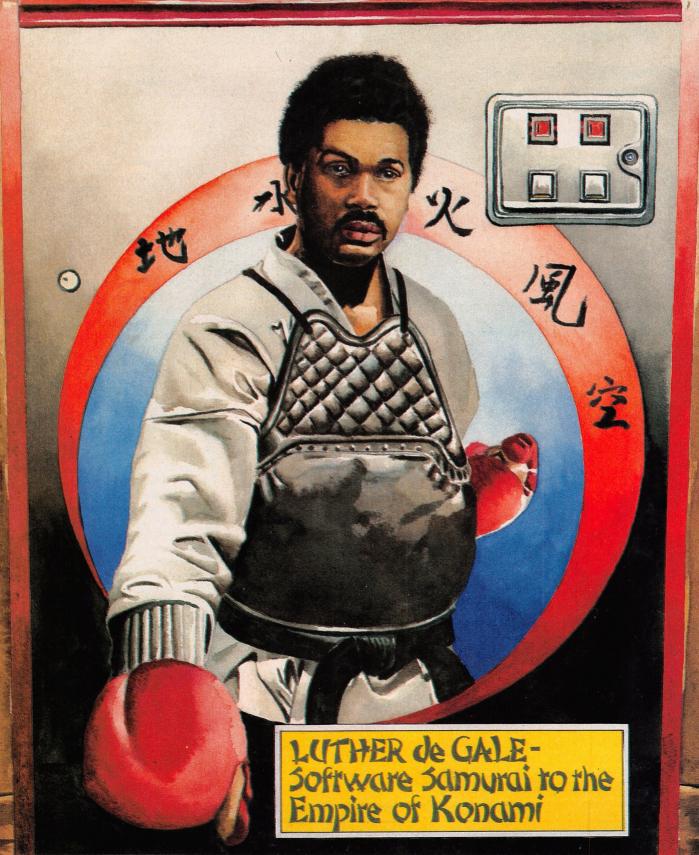
I found Shanghai about as absorbing as Patience and thoroughly playable. 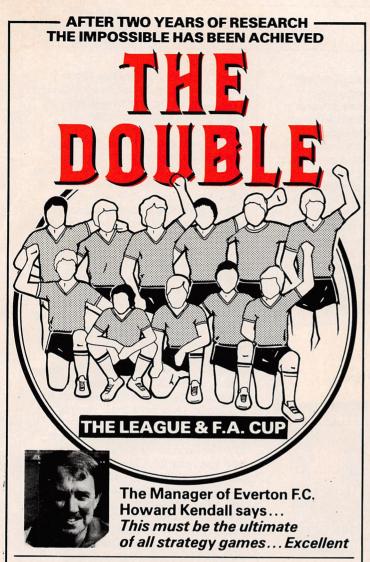

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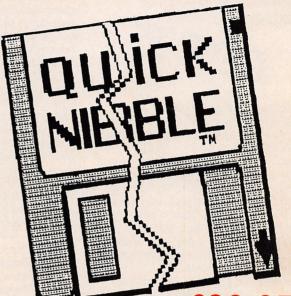
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Treasure Hunt Macsen



The object of Treasure Hunt is to solve various geographical quests, following cryptic clues that take you to various towns and places in Britain. You may fly or walk between these places and are conveniently provided with a helicopter that has apparently limitless fuel, and seems to fly at roughly the speed of sound. Which towns you must visit are hidden in the clues and you unravel them using a comprehensive booklet

of geographical notes.

On screen, Treasure Hunt is very simple. A map screen fills up with locations as you visit them (often overwriting itself quite badly), and a helicopter screen shows (text only) where you are, what the current clue is, and how long you have left to solve it. You are asked for simple commands (usually the name of the place you wish to visit, or the direction you want to walk in) and it obeys with an 'OK' message or a 'well done' if you are on the right track. The interpreter seems to have minor bugs, telling you some locations don't exist when they do, and Annika Rice, who used to run around a lot like an idiot, shouting a lot and shoving her burn at the camera in the original T.V. show would have been delighted with a

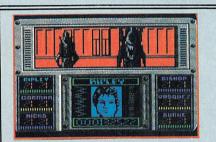


helicopter that miraculously appeared even though you had strayed miles away from it, whenever you said Take Off.

All the real action involves searching your notes for information that will suggest your next location. Once you have this, you simply tell the computer and you are taken there. In actual fact this was an intriguing little process, and if the game had been a little friendlier I might have played a little longer. Unfortunately as you can't abort a quest you're stuck for quite a while each time you run out of ideas, and the stupid little tune that can't be turned off drove me quite barmy in the meantime!

It's clear that a lot of work has gone into this. The notes are excellent, and there are several quests on the tape. It would seem however, that Macsen's good intentions have come to very little. If TH had been an Adventure, with a decent interpreter, or a Simulator with even passable graphics and the opportunity to map and navigate your way around the problems, then it might have been a very good game indeed. Unless Macsen sign a deal with Denton's or someone with equal games-style expertise I can see little hope for Eastenders, or any other of their future TV licenses really becoming chart toppers.

Aliens Electric Dreams



I've never really had a lot of time for Electric Dreams. Lacking the sophistication and sheer excellence of its parent. Activision, E.D. have tried to balance this with the entreprenurial flair of Rod Cousens — old Mr. Quicksilver himself. Big licenses (Back to the Future), big causes (Soft Aid), and big gambles (remember the Dandy/Gauntlet fiasco of last year?) have all failed to conceal the dearth of sound games design at this prolific label. Rod, however, just keeps bouncing back — this time with one of the biggest licenses of the year. Could a computer game actually capture the high-speed thrills of 'Aliens'?

Well, first let's simplify the plot a bit. In this game you know where the Queen, (she's marked on the map), your various team members move separately but without any real sense of each others precense (you can't see another crew member if you're occupying the same room). Newt, the cutsy kid

who is actually one of the Movie's main pre-occupations, is reduced to a random character who gives you a few points and promptly disappears, and the characterisation of your Heroes, which is so important to how they behave in the film, is totally lacking from all but the inlay. What is left is basically 'Shadowfire' with a few pseudo-digitised pictures and a well animated Alien. Because you can't see a bird's eye perspective of where your crew are in relation to their immediate enemies, the strategic side of this game soon becomes confusing. After wondering around blasting Biomechanical growth' (looks a bit like Alien flock-wallpaper) and trying to get my bearings, I surrendered to my inevitable defeat.

All the screens are basically the same, all the Alien-sequences are the same, all the crew members are the same. In short Aliens simply lacks depth and, desite the repeated reference to Mark Eyles, any real sense for game design. At first you may find the graphical representation of an Alien wandering around, turning towards you, and homing in for the kill quite effective but the novelty soom pales. Aliens has sacrificed most of its potential for the sake of gimmicks overused in previous games. Much more should have been made of the Alien's strategy or indeed the machinations of your own crew. As it is, Aliens lacks even the unity of perspective that made Argus's original 'Alien' game (now excellent value at £2.99) such an enjoyable play. I confess to being disappointed. T.M.

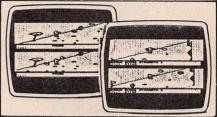
Twinky Goes Hiking not by Firebird DODGY

Between all the bad publicity, the resignations and the hype, Firebird have been slowly getting their act together this summer. On the full price side there was Druid and Sentinel, and for £1.99 there was Warhawk, Ollie and Lisa and Thrust. To misquote Jimmy Greaves, however, 'Software's a funny old game' and no sooner had Firbird started boasting how they'd stolen a march on Mastertronic than Code Masters stole a march on them. Alas it will take better games than this to turn it around again.

Twinky is a kind of horizontal platform-game. There seems only one direction of movement (left to right) and your cute little character runs and jumps against the clock to finish a number of scrolling courses before the time runs out. There is also a second screen where another Twinky (his twin-brother Reg, I'm told) tries to complete the same race in a better time. Split screens have been around now for as long as the old Decathlon games, but only some games and some companies use them properly. This, to my knowledge, is the first budget game to use this format and. frankly, it shouldn't have bothered. The only way to get good two-player action is to have them both present on the same screen (Ikari warriors, Nemesis etc) or have the two screens in genuine interaction (Spy versus Spy, Pitstop II etc). Twinky

does neither, and there is little satisfaction in seeing Reg race to victory time after time without ever really racing against him.

But this is a colourful little game and not bad value. Your man can only really run or jump and you will soon find this is a pretty monotonous process, despite the irritating music. Against him are boulders, crevices, and a variety of worm-like sprites who slither towards him making certain jumps impossible. When you fall, Twinky



seems to dive headlong into the ground (poor animation, here) losing a few seconds before he reappears. Too many of these in one-player mode will almost certainly lose you the game, and I can't say I was altogether disappointed.

I simply can't enthuse about
Twinky. Firebird seem to love these
unplayable 'cute' games (Spikey
Harold, Gerry the Germ goes Body
Popping, etc) and it's perhaps one
of the reasons they took so long to

Your goal cards are worth 1, 2 or 3 goals per match and it's up to you when to use them. Using them takes the form of the computer asking you whether you want to kick the ball left or right—it's here that Sod's law takes over—kick to the right and 9 times out of 10 the goalie saves it. Another expensive goal card down the drain.

If you're feeling particularly lucky you might have a try at the incident cards. These cards are sometimes a godsend giving you the chance of earning lots of money by a quick press of the space bar. You get told things like "The Inland Revenue"

have given you a tax rebate — how much is it?" and get a choice of 5%, 1% or 34, when the cursor is over 5% press the space bar and you get a few grand to keep alive for another week. It's not as easy as that though because the cursor moves very fast. Incident cards aren't all good though and sometimes you get your cheque book stolen and worse still injured, the hazards of the game I suppose.

When I first played this game I hated it and was hugely disappointed, but it's grown on me a little, since I had a little talk with O.S.E. (our sacred Editor) and now though still disappointed, like it a little more. Some of you out there will love it, but I'd think twice about getting it.

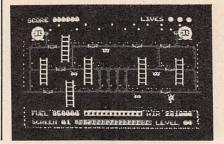

In the first section, unarmed combat, you must do battle with a couple of ninjas and a few goblins who brandish evil looking swords.

In pole fighting it's the ninjas again always game for a fight, with dwarves backing them up with hefty maces. You fight over a slippery log and if you happen to put together a sequence of ungainly moves you fall head first into a pod.

Sword fighting is the last of your encounters and you must beat another ninja and a man with boots and head-dress. The booted and head-dressed warrior is armed with a long sword and he leans forward and chops you in the head while you can do nothing about it. I found the best tactics were to hit and run

The game has a large variety of opponents awe-inspiring graphics that scroll at three different speeds — foreground the slowest, clouds the fastest. Tynesoft seem to be making one quality game after another. They have now released a state of the art platform game — a classic of its kind.

Jet Set Willy, Manic Miner, etc were some of the earliest games round and no doubt many of you will be wondering if this stands the test of their time. Well, have no fears, for Tynesoft, whose dedication to quality in the less popular machines must be applauded, have come up trumps with this conversion of Jet Set Willy

It has (and you can count them if you want) over eighty screens of frustrating, addictive, brain-teasing fun and turbo loads in four parts, fully utilising the total C16 memory. This is an idea which up to now has only been used by very few software houses, and it should be used more often. Follow their example, C16 software writers.

Here is the plot of Jet Set Willy II; You are Miner Willy and you were recovering in hospital from a fall down the stairs. While you were gone however, the builders came in and added lots of room to your mansion. Now you must clear up the mess they've made — which entails lots of exploring and collecting on your part — an arcade adventurer's dream. I say arcade adventure because, as in Monty on the Run, you can explore all the locations of the house before actually trying to complete the game. This, in both

these games, is an excellent idea and takes them out of the simple platform category. Jet Set Willy II's graphics are excellent with brilliant animation — especially the walking fish bowls (which remind me of Noel Edmunds, don't ask me why) and the laughing and blinking heads. A lot of expert programming has gone into these features. Tynesoft tell us that it was programmed close to their Newcastle home. I believe them but it is good enough to have been accomplished by the great Udo (Winter Events) Gerz. Odd, how other Commodore Magazines have suddenly woken up to him after we gave him an Oskar, isn't it?

Jet Set Willy II's playability is really incredible. I still don't believe how terrific this game is. This is an all-time C16 great, definite and immediate addition to your collection.

There will be arguments whether this is better than Monty on the Run, but then this is four or five months later and so there are bound to have been improvements in technical sophistication.

Tynesoft are really making a real showing in the software stakes and I can't wait for their next game — said to be an awsome shoot 'em up of the classic style.

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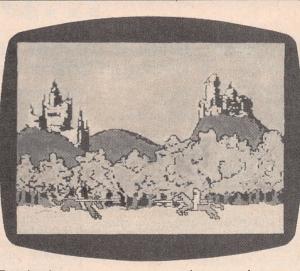

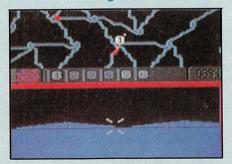
C64 Tracker — Rainbird Software Graphically the game is rather

The Art Studio, The Music System,
The Pawn — The story unfolds for
Rainbird, Telecom's newest label
and the one that currently occupies
that dangerous area of software
called 'leading edge', once the
personal stomping ground of
Bevond.

The problem with such accolades, as Beyond themselves would testify, is that it only takes one or two turkeys to shoot it to bits. While Starglider may have introduced Rainbird to the masses, I fear Rainbird's reputation as the class Adventure and Utilities house may be now in jeopardy. For, alas Tracker will do them no favours at all.

The main problem is that it attempts to hype itself into areas that it's ill-qualified to occupy. Artificial Intelligence, for instance, is mentioned several times in the packaging, but in effect all you have is a tough opponent and you'd expect that in any decent computer game. Likewise, claims of it being a combat simulation are shot down as soon as you see the graphics, and the arcade screen is really not of the standard we'd expect from a game almost 2 years in the writing.

It certainly attempts to set a new standard in its class, but what we have is really 2 games - one Strategy, where you remotely control your units on a map of the playing area, and one Arcade, where you shoot out your enemy in one-to-one combat. The strategic bit is simple and actually quite absorbing: you start with 3 units which move around on the Trackways (a bit like Tube lines) as and where you direct them. You may either do this directly, telling each unit where to go at each junction (or node, as it is called) or you can set a course for the unit and it will proceed to that point automatically. Obviously units are sent out to stop you, and this is the main point of the game where artificial intelligence is supposed to come in. Some nodes are really Communication Centres (only colour distiguishes them) and these have to be disabled to regain control of the playing area. At any time you may call down reinforcements (up to a max of 9) if the unit you wish to support is in a friendly Sector (ie, the Comm Centre is destroyed) and these units are then controlled individually in the same way as before. Accessing these units is as



simple as pressing their number on the keyboard and there is on-screen status-line to show you which units are in use, which are in danger, and which are destroyed. The main problem with Tracker is

The main problem with Tracker is that you can't remotely engage enemy units, only avoid them. Thus every time you are under attack you must switch to the very dull arcade screen (showing your Unit in the trackway) and wait for your opponent to appear ahead of you. Shoot a few times and he's gone, but if more than one of your units is in danger you will almost certainly lose the others while you are waiting for your first kill to appear.

Graphically the game is rather dull with colour used unimaginatively. I was disappointed to see no distinction made between types of enemy unit, or geographical differences between Sectors, both fairly simple alterations to include. The on-screen map scrolls well, but enemy units are shown as coloured blobs and in a hectic battle it soon becomes very confusing as to which are your most immediate dangers. It's a shame Tracker didn't drop the arcade screens and attempt to be a really good wargame, because I'm sure with a little variation it would have made it. Some of the reviewing team had different ideas and thought that Tracker did have something going for it. There were comments like Tracker could top the addiction charts... it is an interesting mixture of styles... it could top the addiction charts' and even that 'it was terrific value for money'. I disagree.

In 1987, with games like The Sentinel selling for under a tenner, I'm tempted to say nothing's worth £17.95 and certainly not Tracker. If Rainbird are trying to imply that long and expensive development time has to be recouped by a high cover-price, then the product should at least demonstrate the technical brilliance of The Pawn (also years in the making). Most software houses could have polished off Tracker in under 6 months and some might have rejected it even then.

What you can say is that Tracker is a try at something different, but probably Rainbird will do better than this next time.

Space Harrier — Elite

Once again Elite take us into the land of the arcade machine, this time with Space Harrier. You are off to try and save Dragonland and being the seasoned spacewar veteran that Elite say you are, that should be no problem. The Dragonland is occupied, so I am informed, by evil, barbaric creatures hell bent on your destruction. They are supposedly controlled by a supernatural phenomena. So what are you waiting for? Get out there and do battle with these deadly alien beings.

The view you've got of the playing area is very much like you had in 3D Deathchase. The concept of the game is also very similar. You have got to avoid the trees and pillars whilst trying to blast the aliens. You have a time limit in which you can try and get as far as you can and get a few thousands. As you progress through the levels and run out of time you then get nine lives to finish the game and save Dragonland. A simple enough game for the arcade, shoot 'em up addict but it hasn't really got the substance to hold my attention for very long. There was not enough variety. The graphics are not up to the usual Elite standards because



they have a rather unfinished chunky look. The sound is reasonable but not up to standard once again. Quite playable but not the best one Elite have done.



Nosferatu - The Vampyre

Nosferatu (what a name! reminds me of Nosmo King — No smoking, geddit?) is the title of the latest arcade adventure from Piranha Software.

The story goes as follows.

You begin the game as Jonathan Harker, an estate agent clerk who has shown a first time buyer this wonderful enchanted castle. However, you place down the important papers and when you go to find them, they have disappeared. This is when you discover that the hopeful buyer is really Nosferatu — The Vampyre.

So you, Jonathan Harker, must find the title deeds to the place and escape from the castle in Wismar. Nosferatu walks the castle at night but in the daytime he sleeps but just in case you thought it was going to be fun, there are rats, bats and spiders which drain your energy. Not a really recommended place for a quiet vacation. You can examine most objects such as beds. cupboards, tables etc to try and



find some things that may help you in your quest. Some of them will give you a considerable advantage, so examine them carefully.

There are three parts to Nosferatu the Vampyre. In the last part of the game you have to lure Nosferatu to your room and hold him there until dawnbreak and then the spell will be broken.

Overall not a bad game at all really, if I did have criticism though it would be that you have to complete part one to enable you to see screens two and three. The first part reminded me of Fairlight it was entertaining and kept your interest. Both graphics and sound were good, although controlling your character with the joystick was a little tricky at times. This is surely a game that will appeal to more than the late night TV horror watchers. It demands a considerable amount of attention, and it is fun to play and is good value for money.

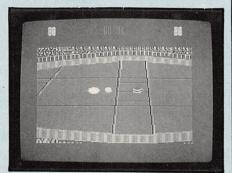

Now, though many years from those early games, the game of Xeno, named after the earth colony on Io, has become more sophisticated, but it is still a test of physical power. The idea is to take turns in shoving the puck and trying to get it in your opponents goal. Although Xeno has a very simple basic idea and easy gameplay it is a suprisingly addictive game. The game is played in four quarters and each quarter can last from one minute to nine minutes. The player who has scored the most goals is deemed the winner, after your chosen length of time has elapsed.

The graphics are nothing special but are good enough and effective for their job. The game has nine different computer speed levels from mega quick to dead slow. The little board which shows quarter you are about to play in swirls on like when the BBC in 'Top of the Pops'.

When this package was first brought to my attention. I was more than a little interested, as it sounded quite a novel idea to emulate a successful boardgame. Well hasn't Trivial Pursuit done well? In this case the game in question is one that I have played on numerous occasions and enjoyed immensely.

The idea is a sort of Cluedo-type affair where the players take on the roles of Holmes, Watson, Lestrade and Adler and try to be the first one to solve a case. You throw a dice and move around the board into selected locations where hopefully there will be a clue waiting for you in the guise of a clue card. Once you think you know who did it, why, and with what, you rush back to Baker Street and announce your deductions.

So much for the board game, what about the computer version. Well the graphics have been done by Interplay, who have been responsible for some terrific adventures, like Borrowed Time,



and Tass Times, so that's good. There are 30 cases to solve, each one set out for you in a casebook, that's good too. Load up...play, and oh dear it's all a bit boring, that's bad. This is definitely one case of board game should not go onto computer without changing it a bit' syndrome. You press a button, and the dice number is chosen for you, you move the little figures (pretty though they are) around a 3D grid which has the buildings dotted about, you go in one, get your clue (it's very easy) and then you have to do it all again.

True, there are some very nice spot fx, and even a bit of digitised speech thrown in. A lot of what I call twiddly bits. But what is really lacking is the excitement that the board game generates, the game core. Its simply not there. For what this game costs, you're better off going out and buying the real thing, it's miles better.

You were woken up . . . why? Yesterday, or so it seems, you had blasted off from Earth on route for Cygni to spend a year observing the double star. Now you find yourself approaching Earth orbit with the ship preparing to land back at base. You start to become fully awake, and realise of course that it wasn't yesterday, that you left Earth, or the day before for that matter but many years ago. The long journey to Cygni was the reason for the deep sleep, but as you approach Earth, you realise something is wrong. You have been recalled, and revived by the ships computer for a reason . . . but what? As you sweep over the Western Hemisphere you

grow alarmed. Where are the cities, the constant communications chatter, and the busy hubbub of traffic and teaming human life! This was the reason, the planet is completely and utterly devoid of all life. Earth is empty.

On landing you explore the green grasslands (that's all there is now) and find an entrance to a tunnel shaft. Everyone must have moved underground, you muse, but still the eerie silence prevails. Nothing but endless corridors and dead machines. No sign of violence, just .. nothing. This according to the computer is Chicago and . . . but what's this, a terminal with a ready light on! Nearby you see a manual with the words WORLDNET **EMERGENCY OPERATING INSTRUCTIONS** which you hastily read and realise that if you can communicate with the massive database it might tell you what has happened to everyone. You slip in a floppy disc that is with the manual and begin to probe into WORLDNET. You contact Homer, a living biological computer, who also wants to know the truth. Together, you set out to wake up the dormant memory banks of **WORLDNET** so that Homer can begin to remember, and maybe find a solution.

This is a game of such quality and atmospherre that to just give it a quick review just doesn't do it justice. I do not know how Activision keep on coming up with such original software. They had me converted when ALTER EGO was released, a truly innovative piece that, but with PORTAL they have gone one better.

It is billed as the world's first computer novel, and there is no doubt that it goes someway to that end. The story, as you battle through the computers faded memory slowly unravels piece by piece like pages from a book, and the fact that the background puts you in front of a screen in the story, makes it all the more chilling. Here you are (albeit in the comfort of your home) in front of your terminal fighting for answers with Homer.

Remember System 1500? The code cracking game? Well, that will give you an idea of the screen layout for PORTAL. Using the joystick you can roam around the 12 Dataspaces of WORLDNET accessing new data for Homer to interpret for you.

Each dataspace is connected by icons and you can access either

Central Processing, Homer, Psychology, Edmod (education), Life Support, Wasatch (genealogical information), History, Military, Psilink, Scitech, Geography and med 10 (medical information). At first all the dataspaces are empty, bar one, you have to find it, and then slowly things will begin to happen. As the system wakes up again it will start to unravel the mystery, but it's only by your input that this process will carry on. The packaging is superb, with the WORLDNET manual included along with a colour chart and a novelette. With three discs to use this is a game to come back to, but if you have a disc drive save up and buy PORTAL. Its original, unique, and best of all brilliantly implemented.

Before all you Isaac Asimov fans rush out to buy this adventure, a word of warning. Isaac Asimov didn't write this story, he didn't even have a say in the plot. In fact the only connection there is to the great man is that the storyline comes from a tale that appeared in a science fiction magazine bearing his name.

Having said all that though, Kayleth is pure science fiction, and if you like Asimov stories you'll like this. Well the plot anyway, because the actual implementation has quite a few faults to it.

I'll come to the moans in a moment, but let's have a look at the scenario.

You are a Zyronean who has dedicated himself to the destruction of the tyrant Keyleth, who has enslaved the planet in his obsession for Chromazin, a rare mineral. His androids force the people to mine the ore, whilst ruling the planet with a iron fist. You find yourself at the start upon a conveyor belt strapped in metal bands and moving closer to an electric charge from two steel claws. On top of all this, you have also lost your memory, all you know is that you have to survive.

This opening puzzle sets the scene in a very dramatic way and if you can overcome this little

setback, there's plenty more in store. The story is good, no complaints there, but my main moan is that as lot of the pictures are animated, the computer cannot deal with the graphics and scan the keyboard quickly enough, so you have to pause before typing each letter. The other gripe is that Mike Woodroffe has continued to use the Scott Adams style (remember he was the guy who produced Scott's stuff for Adventure International) and I never have liked that presentation. When you examine places you get "there's something here!", and upon taking it nothing tells you what you have! There are some very logical problems and some lateral ones and all in all its quite tough. Its a shame that a good adventure is spoilt by thin text and no thought for the user.

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THE PRAWN

Never does a bus-ride seem more protracted than the one I take after buying a new game.

I sit, fuming at the geriatric performance of the bus-driver. I fidget with the bag. People start to eye me with suspicion. Inevitably, I open the package, reading the instructions thoroughly in order to get myself killed the second it boots up. So it was with Uridium, so it was with Mercenary and when, after a needed respite I purchased The Prawn, I had finished the novella which accompanied it by the time I got to my stop. And perhaps you will experience some empathy towards my suicidal reactions when, after repeated attemepts, the game kept crashing.

Now I am reasonably computer literate, so I ran a series of tests to establish a pattern of faults, but the resulting crashes confined themselves to The Pawn's software. Everything else worked as usual. Could be the disk, I reasoned. So I went back to the shop.

Here's an experience everyone must surely have had. You take a faulty product back to the place you bought it. The salesman looks at you with a broad mixture of contempt and pity, plugs in, turns on or, in this case, boots up the offending item and lo, custard runs down into your collar.

I must admit the chap in the shop was very cheerful about it. He promptly took out another copy and gave it to me, putting my copy back on the shelf

"Will this cure it", I asked stupidly. "No", he replied, flatly. "It's your disk drive alignment". His tone brooked no argument. I took another bus.

The alignment? That the man in shop had blanched at the mention of fixing; the alignment was nothing more than a simple end-stop from which the stepping motor measures its movements. I moved it. No effect on The Pawn, which still wouldn't run, or on my other software, which would. These tests took days while the object of it all was only to get the The Pawn to run. What I did next was therefore born of desperation, the like of which I hadn't experienced since writing my first program.

myself talking to a man at Rainbird about my problem. And more surprised when, in the midst of being nice to me, he told me he was very interested as the company were getting reports of similar faults from the USA.

This was music to my ears for it confirmed some small evidence of sanity. "Listen", he said. I did. "Can I give your phone number to the programmers who wrote the game? I think they might like to talk to you".

I agreed, curious in any case to meet the authors of a sucessful game like The Pawn, and it was certain to be more interesting than watching it crash repeatedly.

Later that day, the phone rang. The voice identified itself as Roddy from Magnetic Scrolls, originators of The Pawn. I described the symptoms and ran a couple tests while he conferred with others at his end. Finally, he asked if it would be possible to see the machine in action.

They boot up The Pawn on my system. It runs the first screen. "It does that", I say. "It never gets past more than two or three, though."
They are up quickly to the fifth screen. More screens. "It must crash soon."... "Hey, I've never got this far."

Indeed, the intrepid chaps from Magnetic Scrolls produced a disk of said game and booted that. It didn't finish loading the first time and the second attempt resulted in a crash after accessing the disk for a picture. This problem appears only to affect software running split screen hi-res graphics. Tricky.

Ken produces another '64 from about his person and asks me if they could possibly take mine away to examine the fault in more detail. I can hardly believe my ears: I buy some software, my computer won't run it. I ring the software house and the writers bring me another computer on which to play their game. Customer support as it should be!

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Soundscape — Pro Midi Studio

The Soundscape Pro MIDI Studio is not just another 'Music Programme' but is a complete music package running under a dedicated multi-tasking music operating system. It comprises several programmes called modules that run simitaneously and independently of each other. These modules use MIDI to transfer music data back and forth to each other and between the Amiga and any external music equipment you may have connected to it. MIDI as I'm sure you know, is an acronym of 'Musical Instrument Digital Interface' which is a series of specifications agreed on by various electronic musical instrument manufacturers to enable their equipment to communicate with that of any other manufacturers using the same standard.

The modules on the Soundscape disk are:

CLOCK — Used to provide timing signals and synchronize modules and external MIDI devices.

CONSOLE KEYBOARD — Enables you to use the Amiga's keyboard as you would a synthesizer keyboard.

MIDI IN — Passes signals from external MIDI devices via a MIDI adapter to the other modules.

MIDI MIXER — Accepts input from the other modules on any of 16 different MIDI channels. It mixes together any signals that come in on the same channel and sends the result out on the same channel

MIDI-OUT — Sends signals from other modules to external MIDI devices.

PATCH-PANEL — Allows you to route signals from any module to any other module by simply pointing to the icons of the modules you wish to link. Double clicking on an icon gives access to that module. Soundscape has been designed

with expandability in mind and as additional modules are released in the future it will automatically add icons for them in the patch panel.

PLAYER PIANO — Displays incoming notes on the screen as a graphical representation of a piano keyboard. The keys equivalent to the notes received change colour.

SAMPLED SOUND PLAYER — Plays notes sent to it from other modules or external MIDI devices using sampled sounds. These samples can be edited and modified to create new sounds/instruments. It will also let you create your own sampled sounds when used in conjunction with the Soundscape Sound Sampler which is available separately.

TAPE DECK — Records signals coming in from other modules or external MIDI devices. These recordings can be mixed, transposed or edited and then played back, driving any other module or external MIDI device required. TAPE DECK can be MATCH and TRIGGER. The PLAY and RECORD modes are self explanatory. When invoked, ECHO mode waits for an input from the Amiga's keyboard or other input source and checks the distance between it and middle C (C4). It then goes on to play whichever track you selected, transposed by this amount. TRIGGER mode will play back a track when it 'sees' a pre-determined trigger note, i.e. if a C had been chosen as a trigger note then playing any other note will have no effect other than to play that note. However, if a C is input, then the track selected will start to play. Inputting another C before the track has finished will reset it and it will start from the beginning again. MATCH Mode is an aid to learning scales, songs, rifts etc. To operate, a pre-recorded track is started in MATCH mode. The tape deck will play the first note of the track and then wait for the same note to be entered on the Amiga's keyboard or on an external MIDI keyboard. If you enter the same note it will proceed to play the next note and so on and so forth through the entire track.

Professional

To cover all of the features of Soundscape would have taken me several days and numerous reams of paper. It is a professional quality music package designed to be both flexible and expandable. It is icon driven and makes good use of the Amiga's friendly Intuition interface. It's easy to drive even for those more interested in the music than what makes Amiga tick. The Sound Sampler is great and is capable of some very impressive 'tricks'. It should keep most electronic-music buffs and novices alike amused for ages. Listening to some of the multi-track recordings provided with Soundscape can be an experience in itself (I think the term is AWESOME). I found Soundscape fairly heavy going initially and it took me several late night and dozens of cups of black coffee to learn how to drive it anywhere near its full capabilities. The 112 page manual is probably fine for anyone familiar with the world of MIDI, multi-tracking and mixing but may seem a little bewildering to anyone dipping their toes for the first time. For the casual music experimenter Soundscape may be a little over the top in terms of money as to make full use of its power would require the Pro MIDI Studio, a MIDI compatible keyboard/synthesizer, the Soundscape MIDI interface and the Sound Sampler. A quick tot up gave me a figure in excess of £600 but you would have to pay far more to achieve the same result from any other source.

Verdict

If you are just an enthusiastic dabbler you could probably pick up a nice all singing and dancing synthesizer for less money, use up less desk space and save on the coffee! But if you have an Amiga, and have a need or an urge for a powerful and professional music 'tool' then I would have no hestitation in recommending Soundscape. It is by far the best MIDI music package I have ever had the good fortune to use.

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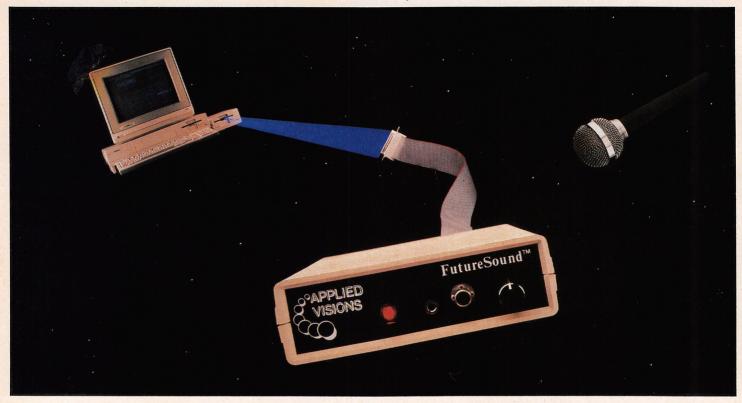

So here is the clue, hot from the authors: having found something to distract the dragon you must do it twice, finding two different verbs to describe the same action. These two input statements must also be consecutive. Tedious, huh?

The other, devilish problem, was a bug in the save-game facility which causes the devil to kill you, even after you have input the right text. You will know when you got it right as the correct text screen appears, but you get no opportunity to move before your demise. To remedy this, go back to a previous save and

work your way through to the current position. Auld Nick should then be a little more enlightening, asked the right question.

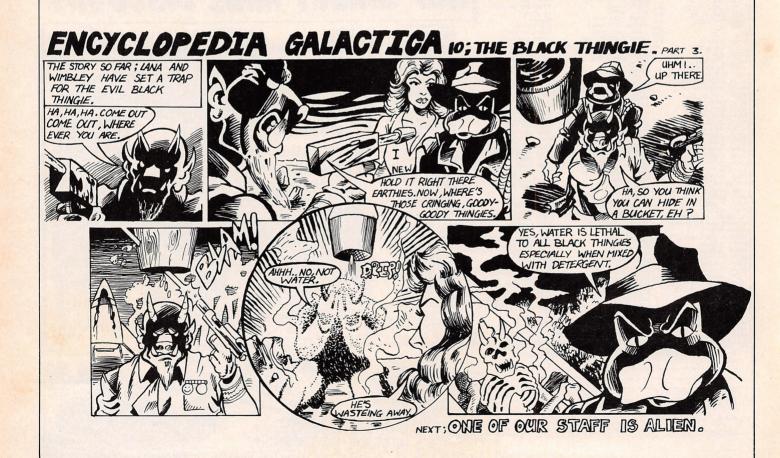

SPRITE 128

This programme was inspired by a letter I received from Michael Grant of Bedworth in Warwickshire. In it he mentions the problems that tape users have in saving Sprite data ie having to resort to using the monitor etc. One solution put forward by Michael is for games writers to leave the designing of the Sprites to the users with the aid of the 128's inbuilt SPRDEF. The writer need only list the number and type of Sprites, ie:

Sprite 1 is your spaceship Sprite 2 is an alien etc etc

Many of the queries I receive about the Sprites on the 128 stem from the lack of information about them in the 128 System Guide which accompanies the computer when you buy it. Here are a few facts which I hope will put you back on the path of fame and fortune.

The default Sprite data storage area is 3584-4095 (\$OEOO-\$OFFF). This area can be changed using the Sprite data pointers which live at 2040-2047 (\$07F8-\$07FF) or 8184-8191 (\$1FF8-\$1FFF) when using hi-res. Most of the 64's pokes will work on the 128 ie:

This is a program to generate data statements from Sprites generated with SPRDEF.

Enable Sprites — POKE 53269, PEEK(53269) AND(255-2^x) Where x = Sprite number (0-7)

Colour Sprites — POKE 53287+×, colour Where x = Sprite number (0-7)

Position Sprite — 53248-53264

Expand Sprite — 53271 (Y direction) 53277 (X direction)

Sprite to background priority — 53275

Sprite collision priorities - 53278, 53279

I strongly recommend anyone interested in programming the 128 to get their hands on a copy of the 128 PROGRAMMERS REFERENCE GUIDE where you should find most of the answers to most of your problems.

SPRITE 128 is a programme to put your Sprite definitions created with SPRDEF into data statements. Type in the program making sure to save it before trying to run it. Once debugged and saved you can proceed to design your Sprites using SPRDEF. When you have finished your masterpieces load in SPRITE 128 and run it. You will be presented with 'FIRST LINE NUMBER FOR DATA' to this you give the line number at which you want your Sprite data statements to start. You are then asked for the first and last Sprite numbers of the Sprites you want. The defaults are 1 and 8. If you only want one Sprite ie Sprite 2 then type 2 for the first and last numbers. When all the data has been written the programme will delete itself leaving only the data. I hope this will be of some use to all you keen BASIC 7.0 programmers. Many thanks to Michael for his input. Keep the ideas and questions rolling in.

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Uni-Tape Header Reader

In the past, there have been many versions of a program which will 'read' a cassette tape header. Invariably these have only extracted information such as the program name, the start/end address and the program length. However, there is one more piece of information which lives in the first byte of the header. This byte is used to inform the computer in which format the data was saved, ie Basic, Machine Code or as a Sequential file. In addition, by using some of the above information, you can find out even more about how your program was saved, ie an approximate load time and the likelihood of the program having been saved using a Turbo and/or an Autorun routine.

Since the Commodore range of computers (except the 'AMIGA') each handles

the tape header in much the same way when saving and loading, I decided to write a program, which would not only supply all of the information mentioned above, but would also run on a range of computers, ie the C128, C64, VIC20, PLUS 4 and the C16.

It must be said, that this utility will only tell you how a program was saved, ie as Basic or Machine code, and should therefore only be treated as a guideline as to the type of program being read. The approximate load time, is taken from when the program is 'found', to the end of the load. In order to compensate for the variance in speed between different Datasette's, you should first record the time taken to load a Basic program, then using this utility to find the program length, divide the length of the load time. The result will be the value of 'BA' in line 10. Repeat the procedure with a Machine Code program, for the value of 'mc', also in line 10.

In order to ensure this utility will run on each of the computers mentioned, you should substitute the value's in line 10, of 'LOC' (Start of cassette buffer) and 'SCREEN' (Bottom of screen memory) with the appropriate values, which can be found in table A

It is the largest information provider on Prestel — the UK Viewdata (or Videotex as it is called in other countries) service. Micronet's range of services is still increasing. They include Celebrity Chatline on which CCI's Managing Editor recently faced a highly informed, sharply questioning audience. Someone at Micronet told him that Commodore owners were just that little brighter than other micro owners. Not altogether a surprise!

About 30% of all Prestel subscribers are Micronet members as well. Micronet however, is not confined to the UK and is currently involved in worldwide activities.

Simon D'Arcy commented, 'International Packet Switch Stream provides cheaper international online charges, and we hope that as international data traffic increases, so the cost will ultimately come down.'

Micronet Moving Worldwide

Micronet began life purely as an information service offering news and advice to a hard-core of micro enthusiasts, but has developed many unique applications for the Prestel software enabling its members to communicate with each other on an unprecedented scale. As its services grew, so did its membership, and consequently, the telephone traffic generated by Micronet members. As a result, Micronet is seen by many countries throughout the world, as being the standard on which they should model their videotex services.

Trigger product

Simon D'Arcy, Micronet's Commercial Director explained, 'What many countries need is a trigger product that will generate interest — a Micronet-type service is ideal. In a sense, our database justifies the whole concept of introducing public videotex system for those countries starting out.'

It all started with G.E.C.'s bid for an Italian contract. The competition was strong — I.B.M., Olivetti, and even I.T.T. all bid to create a videotex system for S.I.P., the Italian telephone company. If G.E.C. were to win the contract, they would need to include Micronet in the package thus providing the trigger product that would give the Italians an immediate application.

Database management

G.E.C. subsequently won the contract on the basic that Micronet — in the form of D'Arcy and Technical Director Mike Brown — would provide the support to actually launch the service in Italy. This included not only the software that was needed, but also the training and advice in database management and the opera-

Italy isn't alone in having an interest in Micronet. Countries already running Micronet include Hong Kong, Israel and Belgium. Micronet have also been approached by Australia, Portugal and Greece. New Zealand, as well, already has a system installed and are presently carrying out feasibility studies as they have an enormous number of micro users there.

At the moment, much of Mike Brown and Simon D'Arcy's time is taken up



Education is part of the microcomputing CUG (Closed User Group) and Micronet hope to represent Prestel's educational database when abroad as well. Much of the educational software would be greatly valued by other countries and would provide them with yet another immediate application for their videotex systems.

The next step for Micronet is the introduction of their own in-house editing facilities with their own mainframe computer carrying a replica of the Micronet database. All of their editing will be processed locally with instant updates on Prestel.

Mike Brown said, 'We will shortly have a total in-house editing package using Commodore Amigas as terminals. This means that each frame can be displayed or altered in an instant. We have enhanced the software to such an extent that it is probably the most sophisticated videotex package in the world. Hopefully, it will mean that other countries not only buy our network service expertise, but editing system as well.'

Global Marathon

Micronet and its members are currently sponsoring a member of a team — one of four — that will set off on the oriental route of what is claimed to be 'the largest ever Marathon' — by bicycle.

Micronet is sponsoring Aiden Prior whose team will, after leaving Hong Kong cross China, including riding along the Great Wall and continue along the Arctic Circle then down through Denmark, Germany and finally — after covering approximately 12,000 Kilometers coming to rest at Amsterdam, followed by a rally with other bikers to London.

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Windows Galore on the C64

by Peter Lager

With this program any rectangular portion of the screen together with its associated colour memory can be saved to a storage buffer. The portion of the screen saved is called a window and can be displayed at any time and at any position on the screen with incredible speed. This ability can be used in pull down menus or animation of LORES displays etc.

PROGRAM DETAILS

1) The machine code resides in high RAM from 52224 (\$CC00) to 53227 (\$CFEB). This leaves 3k from 49152 (\$C000) to 52223 (\$CBFF) for other machine code programs or as part of the storage buffer for windows.

2) It is possible to create windows of any size from 1x1 to 40x25 characters (full screen), to calculate how much of the buffer a particular window requires is very simple. A window of width (W) and height (H) requires HxW bytes for the screen memory, the same for the colour memory and 5 bytes to store the window number, width, height and a two byte pointer to next window in the buffer ie 2xHxW+5 bytes. The way a 3x2 window is stored in the buffer is shown in diagram 1.

3) The windows are stored in the RAM behind the BASIC ROM building up from 40960 (\$A000) to 49151 (\$BFFF). The buffer upper limit, which is initially set at 49151, can be altered by the programmer to give any buffer size from 256 bytes to 11k in 256 byte steps.

To alter the buffer size then use the following command

POKE 53211,160+X

where X= number of 256 byte blocks to make required buffer size.

4) Up to 255 windows can be saved in the buffer at any one time provided there is enough room. It should be noted that any program using this utility is not restricted to only 11k of windows as it is possible to save/load windows to/from disk or cassette during program execution.

5) When the C64 is first switched on the text screen is located at 1024 (\$0400) and the window program will use this

This is a utility type program. It will help BASIC programmers to give their programs a professional look by enabling them to include windows.

location unless told otherwise. If the screen has been moved to a new location by the programmer, then the window program must be alterd with the following command

POKE 53210,X

where X= (Location of first byte of screen memory/256)

Default value of X=4.

COMMANDS AND THEIR SYNTAX

All the commands are executed with a statement like:—

COMMAND 1

Save all windows to disk/cassette SYS52248,1,"filename",8 Change the 8 to a 1 for cassette

COMMAND 2

Load a window file from disk/cassette SYS52248,2,"filename",8 Change the 8 to a 1 for cassette

COMMAND 3

Delete all windows from buffer SYS52248.3

This command must be used at the very beginning of any program using this utility to prepare the buffer for saving windows. There are a couple of exceptions to this rule. First there is no need to use this command if your program is to load windows from disk/cassette. Secondly windows can be shared by more than one program since they are not erased by the NEW command so be careful where you use this command when you chain programs.

COMMAND 4

Delete a particular window from the buffer. (Free the space for future windows)

SYS52248,4,<wno>

COMMAND 5

Save a window to the buffer. SYS52248,5,<wn0>,<xpos>,<ypos>, <width>,<height>

COMMAND 6

Display a previously saved window to the screen. (This leaves the copy of the window in the buffer intact)

SYS52248,6,<wno>,<xpos>,<ypos>,<dflag>

The syntax of each command must be as it is shown here or the computer will display a syntax error message. The parameters that are passed to the program can either be constants, variables or expressions but all have restrictions on their values outside of which error messages are generated see Table 1.

WINDOW NO <wno>

This must be in the range 1-255 and must be unique for each window. There are no restrictions on the order that windows are saved or displayed.

Errors 2 & 3 can be generated. Error 10 is generated if <wn0>=0

WINDOW POSITION xpos>,<ppos>

These represent the column and row of the top left byte of the window save or display position.

<xpos> must be in range 0-39
<ypos> must be in range 0-24
Error 4 or 5 will be generated if outside
range

WINDOW SIZE <width>,<height>

These represent the width and height of the window.

<width> must be in range 1-40

<height> must be in range 1-25 Error 6 or 7 will be generated if outside range. Also error 8 or 9 will be generated if the window does not fit on the screen.

DISPLAY FLAG < dflag>

The value of the flag determines the mode of display and is only used with Command 6.

0- window will overwrite screen memory 128- window will overwrite screen memory but will be displayed with reversed background and fore ground colours.

64 & 192 are the same as 0 & 128 except the window in the buffer is swapped with the screen. Repeating the command will return the original display.

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RESET SWITCH Resets all protected programs

PREPROGRAMMED FUNCTION

Run, Load, Save, Catalog, Disk commands, List (removes all list protections)

ERROR MESSAGES

The program will display an error message and end program execution if the parameters passed to it in the command are illegal values eg. xpos = 41 The error message has the format

<WINDOW ERROR xx> IN In where xx is the error number (1-12) see table 1 and In is the offending line number (In is not displayed in direct mode).

The program is presented here as a basic loader which when run, pokes the machine code into RAM. After this you will be given the option to save the code to disk or tape as a program file.

To use windows in your own programs

then the machine code must be loaded into high RAM. To do this then start your program with the line

0 F=F+1: IFF=1THEN LOAD "<filename>",8,1

Where <filename> is the name of the program file and 8 is the disk drive device no. (change to 1 for cassette).

FINAL POINTS

1) The program does not use any of the 38k of the RAM available for BASIC programs.

2) When the program is first loaded the

buffer is set up at 8k and the program assumes the screen is located at 1024 (\$0400). If you alter these values and then save the machine code with the command

SYS52224, "filename", 8

then these new values will act as the default values when this copy of the program is next loaded.

A short BASIC demo program is included just to give you an idea of what the program can do. Line 1050 of the demo program loads the machine code which had previously been saved with the filename "WINDOWS" and can be omitted if the machine code is already in RAM.

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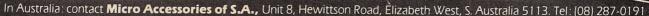

As an additional service to members we are producing disks of directories, so that by sending a blank disk to whichever librarian a complete list of all software for your computer is available in machine readable form (this saves a vast amount of printer time and literally reams of paper). Naturally, as with all ICPUG services, this is completely free to all members.

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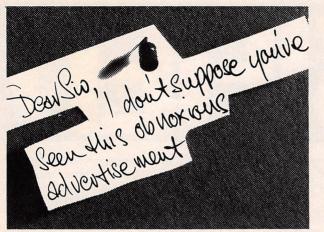
Border Sprite

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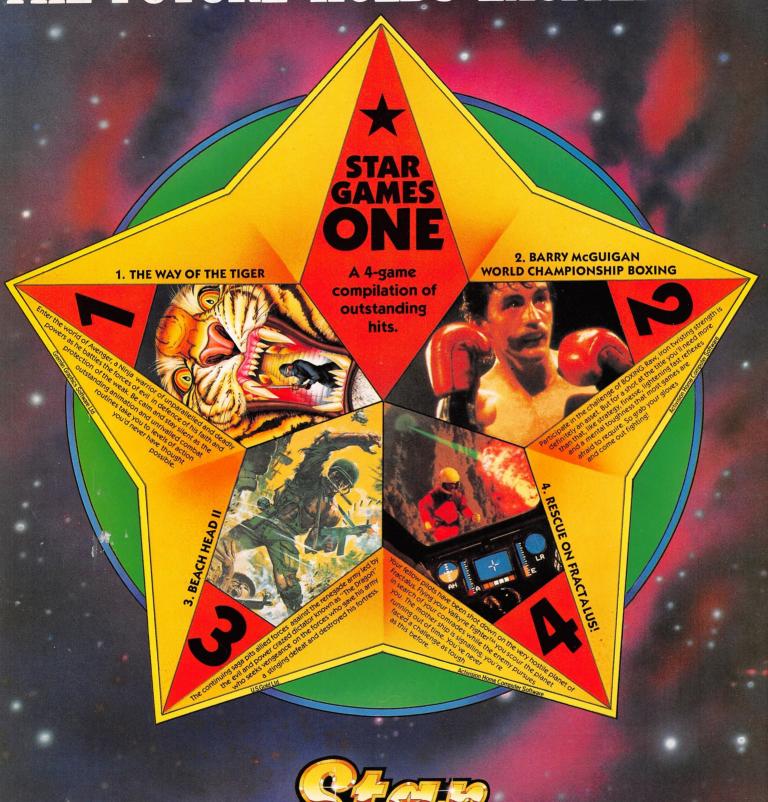
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
